Large corporate honey companies make a lot of money from the manuka-covered hills of the East Coast. While the beehive rental money coming from these businesses is sizeable, a group of local Ngati Porou want to take control of the industry themselves. They've got companies to agree to pay them in honey which they then sell themselves when the price is good. Long term they aim to take over the bee keeping side themselves as well.

Susan was thrilled to hear about the award, which was announced this week at this year's IFAJ Congress in South Africa.

Aaron Smale (print) and Lynda Gray (FAO food security award) were also selected to represent New Zealand.

Obituaries

Alan Hope

Guild Life Member Allan Hope passed away earlier this month in Lower Hutt. Born in 1931, he was buried on 15 March – his 86th birthday.

Allan was one of agribusiness's best-known characters. He started his journalism career with *The Dominion* before becoming an agricultural journalist of some note for the *Dairy Exporter*. Allan was lured to a career in the New Zealand Parliament as press secretary to a succession of Ministers of Agriculture. It is a tribute to Allan that he was re-appointed by ministers of opposing political persuasion. He worked in Parliament for five different Ministers of Agriculture (six if you include twice for Rt Hon Colin Moyle) and under nine Prime Ministers. During the early 1980s, he had a stint in Australia as NZ's Vice-Consul for Trade there.

A legendary general knowledge meant that Allan Hope was seldom stumped when it came to facts and figures encountered in his publishing career in the agricultural field. He was the Editor/Compiler of *AgBrief* weekly from 1991 to 2006.

John Stirling

The guild would also like to mark the recent death of a former guild member, Jack (John) Stirling), about two months ago.

Guild member Glenys Christian clearly remembers him at "a number of guild events from the 1980s including, I think, the old MSD Agvet Royal Show Study Tour in Southland". She recalled that he also wrote for the Dairy Exporter from around 2007 for a number of years, and wrote the biography of farmer, Colin Richardson Born Lucky. Hugh Stringleman also remembered him at Guild events in Wellington, and said that he also wrote for NZ Farmer in the late 1980s, early 1990s, but resigned to go back farming at Milton.
