

Great Tales from Rural New Zealand

The latest bestseller from master storyteller Gordon McLauchlan has 48 intriguing, quirky yarns on rural life, the land and the people.

As with his earlier books (both reprinted) – *Great Tales from New Zealand History* and *A Short History of New Zealand* – this acclaimed writer and commentator has found and retold the forgotten tales of



our country revealing many unusual aspects of New Zealand life, this time focussing on rural New Zealand. Stories range from rabbits, to swaggers, to kauri gum, shearers, *land girls and beyond*.

Doing even better than his previous two books, *Great Tales From Rural New Zealand* sold out of its first print run in just four weeks. A quick reprint was ordered and the book is now in stock again, just in time for Christmas.

Off to South African Congress

The 2017 IFAJ Star Prize Contest programme has now been launched, with the sponsorship of John Deere and Rabobank. Key details include:

- * In the Star Prize contests for Print and Broadcast, (Digital, Audio and Video), one entry per guild will be accepted.
- * In the Star Prize for Photography, individuals may enter their own photos.
