Congress 2017

Next year's IFAJ congress is being held in early April in South Africa.

There will again be the opportunity for a guild member to apply to attend, under the Congress Travel Grant fund, from the surplus made from Congress 2015 (this is the subsidy that enabled Gerald Piddock to attend this year's congress). It will be promoted in the next couple of months.

The South African website is still under development (as of Friday afternoon), but I have a digital version of the brochure available if anyone is interested in reading more detail about it. It will start north of Pretoria and move to the Western Cape, finishing with a formal dinner on Friday evening. There will also be post-congress tours to neighbouring countries as well as within the borders of South Africa.

Cheyenne Stein went to Congress 2016, nominated by our Guild to go forward to be selected by IFAJ to attend the Alltech Young Leaders bootcamp and then to the congress. It is likely this sponsorship will be going ahead next year so another New Zealander could be selected for that.

IFAJ journalism awards for 2017

IFAJ will again be running awards for print, digital and photography mediums. These will be available for NZ guild members to enter, and as soon and the information on dates and awards are available, they will be distributed to guild members. Congress 2016 – Report from Ali Spencer

"Dear Colleagues ... "

That was the phrase to preface almost every announcement at this year's International Federation of Agricultural Journalists World Congress, held in Bonn, Germany.

A fast-paced, packed and punctual agenda over three days kept the New Zealand delegation of three – myself, Gerald Piddock and Cheyenne Stein – running, often in different directions over long days. Sustainable agriculture – made in Germany was this year's theme and it was examined from every angle. Read more about the programme at the IFAJ Congress 2016 website.

Elections

Official business saw me representing the NZ Guild at the World Executive meeting, followed by the Delegate's Assembly on Wednesday afternoon. Elections for the World Presidium positions were held. Former World President Swiss journalist Markus Rediger stepped down to be replaced by Canadian Owen Roberts (@UrbanCowboy).

Swedish agricultural journalist Lena Johansson is the new World Vice-President and US communicator Steve Werblow became the organisation's Secretary General. The trio will add their expertise to the World Executive, while outgoing members were applauded for their contributions.

A new Vision 2020 strategy was agreed by the 40 member countries attending the event. This will see IFAJ supporting the basic organisation of member guilds/associations, developing an internet network and involving guilds/associations which embrace, but do not necessarily enjoy, freedom of the press in their countries. This has a 10 point implementation plan (copy available on request).

New guilds

Four new guilds were welcomed to the membership: Bangladesh, Guinea, Israel and Rwanda. Two associations from Nepal became affiliate members.

Spread the word


The vitally important role of agricultural journalists spreading the word about farmers and farming matters was mentioned by speaker after speaker during conference. That is not only to our own respective audiences but also wider, to the general public, and especially about food security, poverty, hunger and climate change. All are pressing matters for the world at large, the speakers said.

"Agricultural journalists have a key role in the future," said Ignace Coussement, the managing director of AgriCord, an international development agency network. "Defend the global in the interests of the consumer and farmers," he encouraged, during a pre-Congress ZEF panel session discussing solutions for global agriculture.

Talking about the extension of technology to farming in the same session, the Honorary President of the German Farmers' Association and of the European Farmers Association (COPA), Gerd Sonnleitner, launched a passionate appeal to agricultural journalists to play an important role in making agriculture a part of normal life. "I count on you to create and promote a better world together," he said, adding that agriculture is "a pillar of society."

Speaking during a sustainability panel session at the main Congress, young German farmer Hanka Mittelstadt, 29, urged agricultural journalists to talk to their urban counterparts. "Farmers do not have time to raise their collective voices," she said. "Please contact other colleagues and politicians. Tell them conventional farming isn't necessarily worse than organic farming."
